From the Rector

In Herefordshire Harvest is celebrated in October, slightly later than other parts of the country; this is because apples are so important to the local economy. At harvest time we celebrate the generosity of God and his love for us in creation. From a spiritual point of view harvest is the celebration of our life's work. "Let us not waste time in idle discourse!" says one of the characters in Samuel Beckett's play Waiting for Godot. "Let us do something, while we have the chance!" But the two tramps do nothing. They wait, they talk incessantly, they even contemplate suicide, but they do nothing. They are waiting for Godot, convinced that when he comes they will be saved.

Beckett's tramps are waiting passively for the arrival of Godot, waiting for salvation. Christians are not called to passive waiting. Because we live in "between times" – between the coming of Jesus celebrated each Christmas and the second coming of Jesus anticipated in Advent – we are called to live the life of the Jesus who is with us now. Part of living this life is keeping alive the assurance of his second coming. This is not easy, but it is important.

The assurance of the second coming is an antidote to cynicism and despair. It tells us that the world need not end with a bang or a whimper, or be subject to futility – it can end as and when God wills, fulfilling his loving purposes for his creation. But this assurance does not invite complacency or relieve us of responsibility to care for the world



and its peoples; by our apathy or irresponsibility we could still destroy the world through our greed, ignorance, selfishness or arrogance. The assurance of the second coming gives us hope and a reason to live the "new life in Christ" to which we are called – the life of the Christ in our midst today.

In our active commitment to peace, justice and reconciliation the person of Jesus can be glimpsed and his love experienced. But it is not just in these "broad brush" issues that we are called to be faithful, for our own individual lives also should display Christ-like qualities.

Paul writes to the Colossians about the life to which all Christians are called and lists the characteristics of this "new life in Christ". These characteristics are compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, forgiveness and love, with hearts ruled by the peace of Christ. Above all, Paul writes, the Christian should be thankful. This is the Colossians' new life and it is ours too. It is an active life, a life that reveals Christ and shares his love.

So, "Let us not waste time on idle discourse! Let us do something, while we have the chance!"

Saltmarshe & District WI

Pam Davenport was our Speaker for the evening on the subject of Growing and Using Chillies. Pam's enthusiasm and passion was infectious from the start. Born in Aberdeen, growing up with her grandparents in Glasgow, she can remember being introduced to gardening by her grandfather who used to grow tomatoes on the window sills. Every space was used. This was translated into doing the same at university and then the realisation " If I can grow a tomato, I can grow a chilli ". Pam spent six years in France, during which time she developed a range of chilli oils.

Pam grows her chillies from seed, which takes up most of January and February. Seeds trays are covered in cling film, placed in stacks and rotated frequently, all the time warmed with hot water bottles. Chillies are "pernickety" things and even using the same procedures year by year can give a different success rate. There are so many different types of chilli; from the very mild to the blow-your-socks-off sort, and the amount of heat generated is measured by the Scoville rating. For example, Hungarian yellow wax is 5.000 on the Scoville scale whereas a Naga chilli is one million. One of the hottest chillies is Carolina Reaper which comes in at 2.2million on the Scoville Scale

Chillies can add flavour to stews, salads and have sweet and savoury uses - chocolate brownies for instance. A favourite product is a breakfast marmalade with pineapple, lime and a small amount of chilli; great at breakfast to kick start the day, useful too for glazing gammon and ham. Chillies have a medicinal effect in that they encourage the release of endorphins in the brain. Pam had brought along lots of dips for tasting and everyone keenly took the opportunity to taste all the lovely samples.

Whitbourne Village Hall Update

In the last twelve months two of the windows in the Village Hall have been broken by people playing ball games against the wall of the Hall adjoining the car park. After the first break various members of the Committee had asked that those playing these

games be very careful because of the possibility of damage; after the second incident the Committee has reluctantly decided to place a ban on ball games against any of its walls. The Committee accepts that the Hall is an important part of the community of Whitbourne and has not taken this decision lightly; however it feels that it cannot accept the drain on its resources or the time of its members without taking what it regards as appropriate action. The cost of the specialist glass alone to replace the last window was £64. Those of you who use the Hall regularly will know from the ball marks on the windows that these are not isolated incidents. This decision has been taken in consultation with local Police and was discussed at the July Parish Council meeting.

Could all householders please ensure that all family members are made aware of what has happened and the action that the Committee had decided is necessary? Village Hall Committee.

Whitbourne Garden Society

Having agreed to re-start a programme of meetings for those interested in gardening, our first meeting was at the Allotments in the spring. With the Village Show behind us, we have a couple of meeting dates organised as follows:

7.30 pm Tuesday September 16th Village Hall **-"Centralised purchasing of seed and garden materials" Please** bring along any catalogues that you know have proved reputable in terms

of service and quality. We will also have a brief discussion about this season's gardening. Please bring a piece of fruit from your garden if you have any ready.

7.30pm Tuesday October 7th Village Hall – "Growing for Showing" a talk by Bob Oliver about how to grow quality plants and prepare them for judging.

There will be a meeting in November or February, exactly which date depends on the availability of the speaker. The talk will be based on Fruit Growing. We should have details by the beginning of September. There will be a further meeting in the spring, subject and venue to be decided. As this is a new committee, we are running a little bit hand to mouth in terms of securing dates for meetings, but I am sure that we will soon get into the swing of planning well in advance.

Meetings are free for members and cost £3 per meeting for non-members. Membership is £5 per person per annum and will enable you to buy discounted seeds and gardening materials as a Garden Group if that is what is agreed in September.

Although we are re-establishing ourselves, the good news is that if you come along you won't be given a job to do (unless you ask for one), as we have people lined up to do the tasks needed at present. Greater Whitbourne PCC

Most of July's meeting was taken up with a talk by John Daniels, the Local Ministry Officer, and Penny Evans, Local Ministry Development Advisor, to explain to us the purpose of Local Ministry teams and how to go about forming them.

An LMDG (Lay Ministry Development Group) is appointed by and is accountable to the PCC. It is commissioned by the Bishop and Local Ministry Officer, and lasts for four years.

It acts as a focus and catalyst, developing new ideas and thus strengthening our churches by providing services and activities which will cater for a wider variety of people. e.g. the group could organise special services (Pets service, Songs of Praise...?) in each of our churches. They could also organise all services well in advance, ensuring that they are well publicised. There is a certain amount of training involved for team members.

We are committed to forming an LMDG – many parishes in the Diocese now have them and certainly, if we can find the right people, a good group will be an advantage and help our four communities to develop.

The PCC will be considering a possible remit for the group and the nomination and selection process at their October meeting. Nomination could take place over several weeks; anybody in 'the church family' can be nominated, with or without their knowledge. The Rector then draws up a short list of nominees and asks

each person if they are able and willing.

We are hoping to press on with this and, if possible, to have a Group in place by Christmas, although this might be hopelessly optimistic.

The rest of the meeting dealt with routine matters which were despatched fairly quickly. *Brenda Allan*

The committee may meet through the year, dreaming dreams and telephoning people, but success depends on everyone, from stall-holders and ticket-sellers, to prizegivers and cake-bakers, the folk who are on site soon after 7 am and those who help with the packing up at the end. And, of course, to the large numbers who come and enjoy the day.

Christopher John Harris

3-7-1923 - 11-7-2014

Chris was born at Chepstow, Monmouthshire. He was the second eldest of 13 children. In 1926 his family moved to Bockleton and in 1928 to 'The Firs' on Bromyard Downs. Chris attended Brockhampton School and was a choirboy at the Downs Mission. He left school in 1937 aged 14 and went to work for Mr Tom Oliver as an errand boy. After 6 months he went to work for Mr Henry Hughes, a gentlemans outfitter in Bromyard for 3 years. Chris joined the Navy on 15th September 1941 at the age of 18 on an escort minesweeper. His first 2 years were spent on HMS Tadoussac escorting convoys to and from America, Canada, Newfoundland and Iceland. After D-Day he joined the aircraft carrier HMS Begum and sailed across to the Indian Ocean, where he served until VJ Day (Victory over Japan). He was awarded the Burma Star with the Pacific clasp for this. He was also awarded The Atlantic Star, The Pacific Star, The 1939-45 Star and the Oak leaf emblem and the 1939-45 War Medal. He was on his way home in the Indian Ocean when HMS Illustrious was attacked by the Japanese so he had to stay. He was demobbed in March 1945.

He worked with his brother Jim at Upper Norton for Mr Charlie Page. He lived at 'Hedge House Farm' and 'Ireland Cottage' before moving to 'The Upper Grounds' to work as Farm Bailiff for Major M.A. Belleville in 1950. In 1985 he moved into 'Forge Cottage', Tedstone Delamere

where he lived until his death. He had 5 children: Elaine, Mervyn, David, Wendy and Lucy; 11 Grand-children and 9 Great Grandchildren. Chris loved his family, his country (England and Wales) and especially Tedstone Delamere, his Church and his beloved sheep. He still farmed his sheep long after he retired.

Chris was Churchwarden for many years at Tedstone Delamere. He was also Secretary, Treasurer and Chairman of the PCC. He served on The Greater Whitbourne PCC for many years and was Vice Chairman. He was Chairman of the Standing committee and a member of the Deanery Synod. He was a Parish Councillor for Tedstone Delamere and later Upper Sapey, on the North Bromyard Group Council and also Chairman for many years.

He was Treasurer, Secretary and later President of Saltmarshe and District Hall. He was Chairman and Treasurer of the Flower Show Committee. He was MC at whist drives and organised discos for the Hall. He loved hunting with the Clifton-on-Teme Hunt where he was 'cap' man. He was a superb dancer and he liked to play whist, darts and crib.

His funeral service was very well attended and donations for Tedstone Delamere Church amounted to £1,045. I would like to thank the staff of Monnow Ward at the County Hospital Hereford, Bromyard Hospital, everyone at Nunwell Surgery, the carers and Emma and staff at Handley's Funeral Directors for their care of Chris and their kindness and help to me and my family. Also Ann, Sue

and staff at Sapey Golf Club and for all messages and donations received in our sad loss. They have been such a comfort. *Kathleen Harris*

Denys Gueroult MBE

"The death is announced of Denys Gueroult, after a long illness, at the age of 87.

After service in the Royal Navy he was fortunate enough to work for the BBC during the extended period of its unchallenged excellence. His interest in the arts, especially music, his eye for the absurd, his ready sympathy, together with a prodigious memory, made him a formidable interviewer (and, in later years, a wonderfully indiscreet raconteur).

On retirement he moved to the Welsh Marches with his partner Chris Philip. Together they maintained a superb garden at Lakeside, Whitbourne, and created the "Plantfinder".

After his partner's death Gueroult turned his energies into fund-raising for the hospice movement, and it was chiefly for his efforts in that field that he was honoured with the award of the MRF."

The foregoing appeared in the national broadsheets last month. Here in Whitbourne we remember Denys as an energetic and generous member of our community for nearly 30 years. We remember his enthusiastic management of the elaborate sound and lighting system for WADS productions, we relished his own highly individual pantomime scripts and enjoyed his regular opening-up of Lakeside in aid of good causes. And at the dinner-table an endless supply of

tales of the great and not-so-good. Not to be repeated here. Bravo, Denys! *Doiran Williams*

Whitbourne and Planning Policy: Letters

Andrew Kneen writes:

I have been shocked to read the criticisms of Gary Swinford in last month's magazine. The time and effort that he has given to Whitbourne is amazing, when he represents so many other parishes as well. We are very lucky to have him and I hope that he will not be discouraged from continuing to serve us.

On the morning that I read the letters, the headline on the front page of the Telegraph was: "Nimbys have had their day," says new housing minister. He went on to explain that this was the result of the new policy, introduced by this government, of a "presumption in favour of sustainable development."

Though no one in Whitbourne is a Nimby, this presumption means, if Herefordshire Council refuses Whitbourne Estates' application and Whitbourne Estates appeal against the decision, the Government Inspector hearing the appeal must decide in favour of the application, unless it is contrary to planning law. Why would Herefordshire Council refuse the application, when they know that it will be approved on appeal and they will bear the costs?

Whitbourne Estates could have submitted their application without telling anybody in advance. Instead they have gone out of their way to consult residents. The access through Acreage was not in their original plan, but was forced on them by the Chief Plan-

ning Officer. We should be thankful that the opposition to it, supported by Gary Swinford, has helped them to persuade the planners to allow access from the main road, as they originally proposed.

Whitbourne Parish Council voted not to discuss the proposed development with Whitbourne Estates. They would have better served the interests of residents by seeking to negotiate improvements to lessen its impact on existing properties.

John Archer suggests that we should vote against Gary Swinford at the next election. I suggest that, if you are against the results of the presumption in favour of sustainable development, you should vote against the party that introduced it, at the next election. Andrew Kneen

Dear Whitbourne Parish **Magazine....**

As a relative newcomer to the greater Whitbourne area, I am very happy to be living in such a richly active community as this one, although I am very fully engaged in my own adventures and can only participate at the moment quite frugally in wider activities.

I am however very happy to receive such a magazine full of community life each month and I read it from cover to cover to see what everyone is up to.

I have to say however that I was somewhat taken aback to read Bishop Magowan's contribution to the July issue. I may be mistaken, but I thought that the Christian teaching was that "Thou shalt not kill" and I have to say that while the Bishop rightly says that war is always a mark of failure, he goes on to say that "the rights to freedom and, for individuals and nations, to selfdetermination remain values worth defending" and this becomes for him a justification for "the great cost both in human lives and precious resources".

I'm not a Christian, I'm not religious in a conventional sense, although I strive for spiritual maturity in my life, and I have to say that it is not the place of religious leaders, in my view, to sanctify taking another human being's life under any circumstances. It is the role of spiritual leaders to teach their flocks that the only way to resolve differences between people is peacefully, and that

to hurt, to maim, to kill is always evidence that the perpetrator has "lost it", is trying to impose their will, is trying to dominate, intimidate, threaten, abuse another through the exercise of brute violence, because they haven't been able to inspire others into sharing their outlook on life, and this is not the mark of an evolved human being.

I have a personal history that makes this issue a live one for me, and, over the years, I hope to be able to bring a modicum of sanity into the way people relate to each other when they find themselves to be at odds with another, or others - I'm not yet ready to offer anything publicly at the moment, other than, as I do today, to publicly state that killing is always evidence, not only of a breakdown, but also a declaration of failure, a declaration of despair, a declaration of having given up on the human race, a declaration of surrender to negativity and self-and otherdestruction, and it cannot possibly be part of a sane and graceful and mature response to life's challenges.

So please, Mr Bishop, return to your origins, and insist that your flock mean it when you declare that "Thou shalt not kill". Otherwise, I will doubt your integrity, not only in this matter, but in other areas too, and rather than that, I want us to be able to hold hands in dignity and behave responsibly as mentors and elders and counselors to those in need, in distress and in despair.

Letter from the Bishop of Ludlow

The late Isaac Asimov, scientist and author of science fiction wrote "The saddest aspect of life right now is that science gathers knowledge faster that society gathers wisdom." He wrote this prior to the digital revolution in which access to information and communications exploded through the internet and technology. If it were true when he wrote, how much more so now as information on almost any subject can be accessed at the touch of a button and an entry into a search engine such as Google.

Of course having that ability to access information is a wonderful resource and many have found it to be an enriching aspect to their lives. However knowledge and information alone do not necessarily change lives for the better. Throughout the summer, the news has made clear over and over that technology, information and knowledge do not of themselves make the world a safer place. Indeed recent polls suggest that many people feel less safe now than in years past. The rise of militancy, the use of information to exploit others and the inability of differing peoples to agree and find peaceful solutions, all point to the difficulty. While many understand that information is power there is a tendency to forget that power can be used either for good or for ill.

William Shakespeare in his play 'As you like it' penned these words: the fool doth think he is wise, but the wise man knows himself a fool. As Shakespeare alludes there is a distinct dif-

ference between wisdom and knowledge. Knowledge is about information and power while wisdom is about their application for good and not for ill. Wisdom requires self knowledge and experience that is honest about the human heart, our motivations and propensities to both evil as well as good. The Christian tradition has long linked wisdom to love and to the God who is the source and author of both. True knowledge of God brings wisdom. Many things done in the so called name of God fail this test. St. Paul in his letter to the Corinthians explores true wisdom and points to Jesus Christ as the one in whom the power. love and wisdom of God are fully embodied. Wisdom is something we and our world desperately need. The book of proverbs puts it like this: Do not forsake wisdom, and she will protect you; love her, and she will watch over you. Wisdom is supreme; therefore get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get wisdom. (Proverbs 4:6-7) + Alistair Magowan

A sense of belonging

Shane lives in Whitbourne and I first worked with him in 2007 on a dance film project in Ludlow. I was really pleased when he signed up for 'Beyond the Pond' which was a 6 day community arts project led by every-BODY dance at Longlands Farm on the Whitbourne Estate.

The project involved people ages 2 to 87 years, from near and far, with and without disabilities. It included people with learning difficulties, sensory impairment and physical disabilities.

Bromyard Beavers and Malvern Special Families groups, local families and individuals visited for arts and crafts sessions led by artist Megan Evans with Anton and Helene (2 volunteer helpers). They created a beautiful stage set which transformed the cattle shed into an underwater world of strange creatures and abundant plant life.

Alongside this was the training and performance project that involved 11 aspiring dancers aged 12 to 45

and it was this that
Shane became part of.
He is now 15 and he,
like most, arrived with
no previous experience
of aerial dance work
and without knowing
the other participants.
Our first task involved
getting to know names
and finding effective
ways to communicate
with each other, as not
everyone had use of

verbal language. We quickly learnt the basics of aerial dance, how to go, stop, turn upside down, spin and balance with the support of the ropes, harnesses and partners. Lunch breaks became social events and very quickly the group gelled into a diverse community that supported and trusted one another.

At the end of the 6 days we had created a 30-minute performance piece with music, costume and water! Each person had a duet and solo moment and there were ensemble unison sections that brought everyone together.

The audience responded with smiles, gasps, a few tears and many words that expressed the impact of the work, its humanness and inclusiveness. Participants, parents and carers told us how it had changed their outlook on ability and allowed them to really get to know people they might not have had a chance to spend time with before. *Rachel Freeman*
