From the Rector

Presentation of Christ in the

Temple (Candlemas) - 1 February In his challenging and deeply perceptive book The View in Winter, Ronald Blythe offers a rich and multifaceted view of the experience of old age. He listens to a huge number of elderly people from all walks of life, recording their individual experiences and, from them, drawing universal principles. His assessment of the plight of the elderly in Britain today is a bleak one: "For all our new caring and planning, to be old today is contemptible." Blythe's analysis as to why this is so sees the old as "part of a huge and ordinary multitude, a section of society so fast-growing in its needs and demands as to create another kind of helplessness in the young and middle-aged, making them feel guilty and resentful." Up to the fairly recent past, continues Blythe, the presence of illnesses for which there were no cures meant that few people lived on into real old age. "The reason why old age was venerated in the past was because it was

With the celebration of Candlemas we remember the visit of Mary, Joseph and Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth. This was an important ritual in the life of a Jewish family, and the presentation of a child in this way was not an unusual event. The legal ritual requirements for purification and dedication meant that families would have been visiting the Temple week in, week out, to offer their firstborn sons to God.

extraordinary."



But the way events unfolded on this particular occasion was not so ordinary. Mary and Joseph are first approached by Simeon. We are not actually told that he is old, but that is certainly the impression given: "It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah." Immediately, Simeon sees the importance of this seemingly ordinary baby, recognising him as the Christ: "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace...for my eyes have seen your salvation." But Simeon's recognition is much more than a vague sense of "specialness": he has discerned that Jesus' significance would spread far beyond the Jewish race, that in his life many would be opposed to him and that Mary herself would suffer because of what was to happen to him.

Our society is not quick to recognise or acknowledge the gifts and wisdom of the older people in its midst. Too often the elderly are considered a **problem, a drain on society's** resources. The Gospel for Candlemas demonstrates the prophetic gifts of Simeon and Anna so powerfully, that it provides a strong rebuke to a society that continues to measure the value of people in terms of their

looks, age and general earning capacity. Even those whom we love we may take for granted; when our parents and grandparents are no longer alive there may be many things we wished we had asked them while we had the chance. Candlemas pictures the elderly as repositories of experience and spiritual wisdom. That, if we will accept it, is their gift to us.

Bringsty Common & the Manorial Court

A QI-style quiz for readers

Parish Magazine readers shared in some of what Paul Friend, the Chairman of the Bringsty Common Manorial Court (BCMC), said at Whitbourne W. I.'s November meeting [see December issue, p.4]. Bringsty commoner Alan Matthews sees more to intrigue in the way that the Common, a national asset as well as a local treasure, is being managed.

Alan has put together a quiz, in a format inspired by the popular QI (quite interesting) quizzes on TV and in newspapers. The (only) prize offered is satisfaction at being betterinformed! His answers appear at the end.

Q1 Keeping it recreational

In his talk, Paul spoke about Bringsty Common being "a recreational rather than a grazing common" now. How does the law say that the modern Common should be managed?

- a) In ways decided through majority vote at BCMC meetings.
- b) As determined by the owner and commons registration authority, Herefordshire Council.
- c) As recommended by Natural England, the Government natural environment body.
- d) As an open space, according to a Scheme drawn up in 1951 under the Commons Act 1899

Q2 Stewardship grant payments Grant money totalling £8,000 p.a. is being paid to the BCMC "for improving the fauna and flora", the W.I. heard. How does the stewardship scheme aim to achieve that improvement?

- a) By cordoning-off areas to stop people trampling on violets, a butterfly-larvae foodstuff.
- b) By erecting scarecrows to stop birds eating rare High Brown Fritillary butterflies.
- c) Through maintaining or restoring the grassland in specified areas of the Common.

Q3 Managing scrub overgrowth

Paul would like the Common "to be grazed, as a good way to maintain it, but this is not practical". How was an offer of scrub management money, to help the BCMC maintain some 8 hectares (equivalent to 16 hockey pitches) north of the old Foxhalls site, dealt with?

- a) A simple plan of the work to be done was submitted to Natural England, as requested.
- b) No plan of work was submitted, and the offer of scrub management money is withdrawn.

Q4 Permanent grassland designation

The 8ha area of the Common, seen by Natural England as deserving scrub management payments, was designated 'permanent grassland' when the stewardship scheme began in 2007. What preceded a redesigna-

tion, announced in 2014, of the area as 'woodland'?

- a) The Council stating, in 2011, that it is using the area to produce long-term timber crops.
- b) Several commoners protesting that the sustained neglect of the area goes against its history.
- c) Uncirculated correspondence between the Council, BCMC people and Natural England.

Q5 Land character & accessibility

The 1951 Scheme for the management of the Common requires (at clause 3) that the Council do nothing that may "vary or alter the natural features or aspects of the Common or interfere with free access to any part thereof". Clauses 4 and 5 require the Common to be kept free of encroachments, for the public to have access to every part of it for all types of recreation. What has been the reaction to protest that the 8ha area is suffering loss of character and accessibility through scrub and tree overgrowth, while the Council uses the land for forestry, all in breach of the 1951 statutory scheme?

- a) The Council's County Land Agent is reconsidering the appropriateness of its forestry there.
- b) The Bringsty Ward Councillor is seeking early revision of the policy of neglect.
- c) The Parish Councillors for Brockhampton Group and Whitbourne are pressing for change.
- d) All of the above, including the three Councillors who are involved with the BCMC, appear unmoved.

Q6 Commoners voicing opinions

Local comment includes that "The Common should be managed as the essentially-open land that it was. The natural environment in that area would be improved by a return of pasture, and most people would prefer the extra light, landscape variety and views, restored in that way. The last significant tree and scrub management action in the area of the Common north of Foxhalls was around 1995, as I recall", and "During my time, there were virtually no trees on the Common. They were removed as saplings, or were pollarded, by local people using their own initiative. The material obtained was put to use in their homes or trades, as fuel, for fences or tools, or for jumps for the local horse-riding community. The Common kept a fine, open character, bringing pleasure to all". Who put those comments on record?

Attention Carers and Disabled People

In April 2015 the new Care Act comes into force, and has national guidelines, which all local authorities must adhere to.

What does the Act do?

The Act creates a single consistent route, establishing entitlement to public care and support for all adults who require care and support. It also creates the first ever entitlement to support for carers, on a similar basis.

The Act outlines steps that must be followed to work out entitlement, and understand the process. Following a person's 'journey' in the care and support system, an assessment will demonstrate eligibility (including a financial assessment). This will determine whether people need to pay for their own care, and in future will include the new capped costs payment system. Once complete a decision can then be made whether the adult is entitled to care and support arranged by the local authority.

When must the local authority **meet a person's care and support** needs?

The Act sets out a new legal duty for an adult's "eligible needs" (determined by assessment) to be met by the local authority, subject to their financial circumstances.

The Act says clearly that a person will be entitled to have their needs met when the adult has "eligible" needs, is ordinarily resident in the local area

- and any of the five situations below apply to them.
- 1) The type of care and support they need is provided free of charge.
- 2) The person cannot afford to pay the full cost of their care and support.
- 3) The person asks the local authority to meet their needs.
- 4) The person does not have mental capacity, and has no one else to arrange care for them.
- 5) When the cap on care costs comes into force, their total care and support costs have exceeded the cap.

On 18th March you can find out more from the Director of Adult Social Care at Hereford Council, Helen Coombes. She will be speaking at Hinton Community Centre, Hereford as part of the Herefordshire Disability United (HDU) Open Meeting. HDU is a local charity providing quarterly information sessions, on topics relevant to the disabled and their families, carers, and older people in this county.

The meeting from 10.30- 2.30 pm is FREE, but you would need to book your place. Other speakers too, all relevant to social care, will be present. A buffet lunch is provided plus the opportunity to speak personally to other organisations present.

- 1) Second only to the wheel, the satnav is a wonderful invention.
- 2) There are many extremely friendly people here. Kay and I appreciate more than we can say, the warmth of the welcome we have received.
- 3) There is much heroic, faithful and imaginative Christian ministry being exercised across the diocese, by clergy and laity alike. In many places, it's tough a lovely environment does not automatically make Christian ministry easy.
- 4) There is more deprivation than is immediately apparent. In many places, churches are responding to this, but I do hear some anecdotes of congregations which seem reluctant to really engage with the community as a whole.
- 5) I have some great colleagues and the staff in the diocesan offices are outstandingly good.
- 6) Just like so many other places in the Church of England, we get things out of proportion too easily; mountains and molehills come to mind.

- 7) Money is one subject over which we sometimes get the worst of both worlds talking about it endlessly without ever really cracking it. We do have to talk about money some of the time in order to avoid ending up talking about it all the time. Having the lowest level of giving in the Church of England is not a record to be proud of.
- 8) There is an urgent challenge to share our faith with others. I understand English reticence and the need to be sensitive and appropriate, but the Christian faith is for all. I long to see more people becoming Christians.
- 9) I am really enjoying living and working here.
- 10) Yes, the cider is excellent and so too is the apple juice.

Solving transport needs for notfor-profit organisations

hvoss (Herefordshire Voluntary Organisations Support Service) MLS throughout Herefordshire; linking groups wishing to use minibuses at low cost for one-stop journeys with minibus owners who will benefit from a contribution towards their vehicle's running costs.

MLS is available to all properly constituted not-for-profit organisations such as community and voluntary organisations, uniformed youth groups and youth clubs, schools and colleges. Upon joining the scheme all groups have access to a list of vehicles appropriate to their needs - passenger numbers, ramp and lift reguirements, a list of volunteer drivers - all at affordable rates. Minibus owners submit details of their vehicles. indicating when they are available for loan. These organisations provide a valued community service whilst increasing their own financial efficiency and publicity through a wider use of their vehicles. MLS administer a smooth and safe booking process, ensuring both borrower and lender needs are considered.

hvoss is grateful to have received some funding support provided by Herefordshire Council and MLS aims to make transport accessible to all schools and community groups, helping to keep minibuses wellmaintained and well-used by everyone. We are looking for both lenders and borrowers to use the scheme regularly.

MLS is also looking for volunteer drivers to join the scheme. If you enjoy driving and meeting people, then driving community minibuses is a great way to get out and about in your spare time.

Drivers must have D1 category and we encourage all drivers to have MiDAS (Minibus Drivers Awareness Scheme) training.
